
International UROP Scholarship!


Several people killed themselves due to false rumors and malicious comments in cyberspace. A famous South Korean actress Choi, Jin-Sil committed suicide owing to malicious comments and false rumors on the Internet. That is, our rumors and careless whispers in cyberspace broke Choi down. The South Korea National Police launched a crackdown on internet activity after a high-profile suicide of popular actress Choi, Jin-Sil, but cyber bullying still have left as a big problem.

South Korea is one of the most wired countries in the world (Jacobs 2010). Cyber bullying is so rampant there that students favor government regulations that require users to provide their real names. Approximately 20% of the students experienced cyber bullying in their lifetimes ("Cyber bullying victimization," 2010).

Surprisingly, there are different features between South Korea and the U.S. In the U.S, bullying is related with race, gender, sexuality, etc, on the other hand, South Korea is related to economic status and class. Lee writes, "It lies within the hyper-competitive nature of South Korean society.
